## **Crewe North**

Future demand for early years childcare places may not be met fully by recently opened, planned and intended expansions, plus the uptake of existing vacant places. Provision will need to be planned for an increase in demand for both out of school places and early years childcare places.



- 7.5% of all relevant providers stated that they had seen a waiting list decrease in size since summer 2021
- 53% of all relevant providers stated that they had seen a waiting increase in size since summer 2021
- For Crewe North Schools Planning Area-based early years childcare providers/settings, the age group that accounted for the highest incidence of vacant places was 3 years, followed in frequency by 4 years

Ultimately, aligned to the period: May 2021 - May 2022:

- 13% of Crewe North Schools Planning Area-based childcare providers stated: Our occupancy has *decreased*
- 52% of Crewe North Schools Planning Area-based childcare providers stated: Our occupancy has *increased*

## Demand

Table 5 presents:

- (a) an indication of the existing level of sufficiency in the Crewe North Schools Planning Area-based aligned to the three types of formal childcare provision: 1/ early years childcare settings; 2/ registered childminders and; 3/ out of school childcare providers.
- (b) an indication about the extent to which forthcoming new housing developments (see Table 1) will alter the sufficiency landscape once all planned developments and new houses are constructed and occupied.

Table 5 indicates that 149 new childcare places may be required by 2027:

- 71 new early years childcare places for 0-4 years would be required to maintain the 2022 sufficiency ratio.
- 78 new out of school childcare places (including actual school-based) for 5-11 year olds would be required to maintain the 2022 sufficiency ratio.

However, it can be noted in Table 6 below that, as part of the response to the summer 2022 CSA structured interviews with childcare providers, a number of early years childcare providers/settings and childminders that are located in the Crewe North Schools Planning Area stated an intention to develop new provision in the forthcoming two years - which was a combined total of 113 new places, for that age cohort.



## Sustainability

50% of early years childcare providers/settings situated in the Crewe North Schools Planning Area stated that they were experiencing **ongoing** sustainability issues as a result of COVID-19 – and repeated themes were:

- 1. Recruitment of staff creating sustainability challenges
- 2. Inability to physical expand in current space

0 out of school childcare providers situated in the Crewe North Schools Planning Area stated that they were experiencing ongoing sustainability issues as a result of COVID-19.

27% of registered childminders situated in the Crewe North Schools Planning Area stated that they were experiencing ongoing sustainability issues as a result of COVID-19 – and repeated themes were:

- 1. Incidence of parents still working from home post COVID-19
- 2. ...Subsequent occupancy challenges

Image C - how parents/families were continuing to feel in terms of their child(ren) (re)attending childcare, according to Crewe North Schools Planning Area-based childcare providers





Image D - length of time childcare providers stated that they expected to be providing childcare for

72% of setting-based early years childcare and out of school childcare providers stated that they had at least one team member with a SEND-themed qualification. Repeated examples of qualifications stated were:

• A trained SENCO

• Staff member(s) with Autism training/qualification





Image E - Numbers of enquiries that responding childcare providers stated that they received in each calendar year from a carer of a child with SEND

72% of Crewe North Schools Planning Area-based early years childcare settings/providers and out of school childcare providers stated that they were still noticing some ongoing effects of COVID-19 on the development, behavior or demeanor of certain children.

Correspondingly, 27% of Crewe North Planning Area-based registered childminders stated that they were still noticing some ongoing effects of COVID-19 on the development, behavior or demeanor of certain children.

Ultimately, all setting-based (early years and out of school) childcare providers were requested to state, on a scale of 1 - 10, how <u>confident</u> they thought they were as a whole setting in supporting children/young people with SEND:

The average rating provided by early years childcare providers/setting was 8.25/10 - and thus it can be assumed that approximately 82.5% of early years providers are accessible to children with SEND in the Crewe North Schools Planning Area.

The average rating provided by out of school childcare providers/setting was 10/10 – and thus it can be assumed that approximately all out of school providers are accessible to children with SEND in the Crewe North Schools Planning Area.

Additionally, the average rating provided by registered childminders was 6.5/10 – and thus it can be assumed that approximately 65% of childminders are accessible to children with SEND in the Crewe North Schools Planning Area.

## Role of Cheshire East Council

Finally, all childcare providers were invited to state the types of further and continued support that they would appreciate from the local authority. The four most frequent requests were:

- 1. Support with meeting the needs of SEND children
- 2. Continued information on the availability of grants (funding)
- 3. Support with mental health and wellbeing of staff and children
- 4. Support to ensure training can be facilitated at weekends

# Perspective of Parents and Carers resident in the Crewe North Schools Planning Area

## Background of respondents

13% of the respondents to the summer 2022 Cheshire East Council Childcare Parental Demand survey were resident in the Crewe North Schools Planning Area.

All responding parents and carers across all of the Schools Planning Areas were invited to state what term best described their current circumstances aligned to their **employment status**. The most frequent stated circumstance of responding parents was in full-time employment/self-employment (30 hours + per week) (28%), followed in frequency by part-time employment/self-employment (less than 30 hours per week) (21%).

All responding parents and carers responding from the Crewe North Schools Planning Area were invited to state their annual family income bracket (before tax).

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### Feedback from carers of children and young people with SEND

13% of responding parents, i.e. carers, who were resident in the Crewe North Schools Planning Area stated that they were caring for/raising at least one child with SEND or a long-term illness.

The most frequent SEND type stated was Speech, Language and Communication Needs followed in frequency by Autistic Spectrum Disorder.

These relevant respondents were invited to describe any particular issue(s) they have experienced as a carer of a child with SEND in accessing childcare – and the most frequent was: Staff are not appropriately trained/qualified to support children with SEND.

- 6.5% of responding parents from the Crewe North Schools Planning Area stated that they were: **accessing informal childcare only**
- 48% of responding parents from the Crewe North Schools Planning Area stated that they were: **accessing formal and informal childcare**

The three most frequent themes and assurances that such relevant parents/carers stated that they would look for if they were to consider accessing formal childcare at some point in the future were – in order of frequency:

- 1. For it to be close to my home/work
- 2. For it to be close to my child(ren)'s school
- 3. Good quality

### Funded Childcare

13% of responding Crewe North Schools Planning Area-resident, parents/carers stated that they had a child aged 2 years. 0 of such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the free entitlement for 2 year olds.

Additionally, 47% of responding parents/carers stated that they had a child aged 3 and/or 4 years and 39% of such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the universal 15 hours free entitlement for 3 and 4 year olds. 30% of such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the extended 30 hours childcare offer, with all of these parents/carers stating that it was either very easy to organise or fairly straightforward to organise – with just one exception, a parent that stated: it was not as easy as I would have liked.

Relevant parents were invited to give further feedback about the free entitlement for 2 year olds. The most frequent type of feedback was (words to the effect): *"ideally this should be open to all parents with a 2 year old"*.

There was no repeated incidence of feedback about the universal 15 hours free entitlement for 3 and 4 year olds.

Relevant parents were invited to give further feedback about the 30 hours childcare offer. Two parents provided feedback – i.e.:

"The application process could be easier. In my opinion it's difficult to coincide finding a job and arranging 'the 30 hours childcare' to start at the same time".

"These 30 hours will change our life when they come into effect when he turns 3 years. Unfortunately '3-5 years childcare' continues to be a problem with a severe shortage of providers in the area... and If the 'pre-school' could have an after school club 2 hours a day, all our issues would be solved".


### Childcare and COVID-19


