The following **early years childcare settings/providers** are located in the Schools Planning Area


- Blue Grass Purple Cow Nursery

There is one **out of school childcare providers** located in the Schools Planning Area: Disley Primary School has an After School Club and a Breakfast Club,

delivering a combined total of 40 places. Two **registered childminders** are resident in the Schools Planning Area and they are accounting for a combined total of 12 registered places.

Table 5 indicates that 4 fewer childcare place(s) may be required by 2027:

- 3 fewer new early years childcare places for 0-4 years would be required to maintain the 2022 sufficiency ratio.
- 1 fewer out of school childcare places for (including actual school-based) 5-11 year olds would be required to maintain the 2022 sufficiency ratio.

It can be noted that the childcare providers located in the Disley Schools Planning Area did not have, in summer 2022, an intention to develop new provision in the forthcoming two years.



Image C - how parents/families were continuing to feel in terms of their child(ren) (re)attending childcare, according to Disley Schools Planning Area-based childcare providers





Image D - length of time childcare providers stated that they expected to be providing childcare for







50% of setting-based early years childcare and out of school childcare providers stated that they had at least one team member with a SEND-themed qualification. Repeated examples of qualifications stated were:

100% of Disley Schools Planning Area-based early years childcare settings/providers that they were still noticing some ongoing effects of COVID-19 on the development, behavior or demeanor of certain children.

All setting-based early years childcare providers were requested to state, on a scale of 1 - 10, how <u>confident</u> they thought they were as a whole setting in supporting children/young people with SEND. The average rating provided by early years childcare providers/setting was 8.5/10 - and thus it can be assumed that approximately 85% of early years providers are accessible to children with SEND in the Disley Schools Planning Area.

Perspective of Parents and Carers resident in the Disley Schools Planning Area

Background of respondents

2% of the respondents to the summer 2022 Cheshire East Council Childcare Parental Demand survey were resident in the Disley Schools Planning Area.

All responding parents and carers across all of the Schools Planning Areas were invited to state what term best described their current circumstances aligned to their **employment status**. The most frequent stated circumstance of responding parents was in part-time employment/self-employment (less than 30 hours per week) (45%).

All responding parents and carers responding from the Disley Schools Planning Area were invited to state their annual family income bracket (before tax).

Feedback from carers of children and young people with SEND

36% of responding parents, i.e. carers, who were resident in the Disley Schools Planning Area stated that they were caring for/raising at least one child with SEND or a long-term illness. The most frequent SEND type stated was Autistic Spectrum Disorder.

These relevant respondents were invited to describe any particular issue(s) they have experienced as a carer of a child with SEND in accessing childcare – and the most frequent was: Staff are not appropriately trained/qualified to support children with SEND.

The two repeated themes and assurances that such relevant parents/carers stated that they would look for if they were to consider accessing formal childcare at some point in the future were – in order of frequency:

- 1. For it to have provision for children with SEND
- 2. For it to be close to my home

Funded Childcare

0 responding Disley Schools Planning Area-resident, parents/carers stated that they had a child aged 2 years.

However, 82% of responding parents/carers stated that they had a child aged 3 and/or 4 years and 22% of such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the universal 15 hours free entitlement for 3 and 4 year olds.

67% of such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the extended 30 hours childcare offer, with all of these parents/carers stating that it was either very easy to organise or fairly straightforward to organise – with just one exception, a parent that stated: it was not as easy as I would have liked. One parent stated how:

"This 30 hours funding made it financially viable for me to return to work and for us to have a second child".

Childcare and COVID-19

All Disley Schools Planning Area-resident parents of pre-school aged children were invited to state whether they had any concerns about their relevant child(ren)'s early development, including their early years education, as a direct result of the COVID-19 pandemic? 27% of relevant parents stated Yes and the most frequent type of concern was (words to the effect): *"separation issues seem to be more pronounced"*.

Barriers to accessing childcare

All Disley Schools Planning Area-resident parents were invited to state whether – at some point in time – they had experienced specific barriers to accessing childcare. One such theme was repeated (by 27% of relevant parents): I could not/cannot afford the childcare that I require.

Childcare and Cheshire East Council

All Disley Schools Planning Area-resident parents were invited to state whether there was anything that Cheshire East Council should be doing in terms of supporting parents and carers with childcare, in 2022. Themes that were highlighted were varied - and included:

The LA should ideally 'create incentives' for more people to become registered childminders. It is a far more flexible and affordable childcare option for families

Funding for SEND children needs to be made clearer to parents and settings and the process less time consuming to access.
Something also needs to be done about the chronic understaffing of most of the local nurseries and pre-schools - they cannot get staff. Some roles are being advertised for over 6 months with no applicants.
Poor transport links mean people at the edge of the local authority cannot access childcare in Cheshire East...

I'd like the Council to help to develop more provision especially in 'fringe areas'... Finally, all parents were invited to state whether they were aware of the existence of Cheshire East Family Information Service. For those who responded to this question: 36% stated that they were – and 64% stated that they were not, or did not provide a specific response either way.
