Macclesfield South

Future demand for early years childcare places may not be met fully by recently opened, planned and intended expansions, plus the uptake of existing vacant places. Provision will need to be planned for an increase in demand for both out of school places and early years childcare places.



Table 5 indicates that 191 new childcare places may be required by 2027:

- 97 new early years childcare places for 0-4 years would be required to maintain the 2022 sufficiency ratio.
- 94 new out of school childcare places for 5-11 year olds would be required to maintain the 2022 sufficiency ratio.

However, it can be noted in Table 6 below that, as part of the response to the summer 2022 CSA structured interviews with childcare providers, 15% of early years childcare providers/settings that are located in the Macclesfield South Schools Planning Area stated an intention to develop new provision in the forthcoming two years - which was a combined

total of 27 new places.



54% of early years childcare providers/settings situated in the Macclesfield South Schools Planning Area stated that they were experiencing **ongoing** sustainability issues as a result of COVID-19 – and repeated themes were:


- 1. Recruitment of staff creating sustainability challenges
- 2. Reluctance of some staff members to be enthused to work at a childcare setting

0 of out of school childcare providers situated in the Macclesfield South Schools Planning Area stated that they were experiencing ongoing sustainability issues as a result of COVID-19.



<u>Image D - length of time childcare providers stated that they expected to be providing childcare for</u>





80% of setting-based early years childcare and out of school childcare providers stated that they had at least one team member with a SEND-themed qualification.



56% of Macclesfield South Schools Planning Area-based early years childcare settings/providers and out of school childcare providers stated that they were still noticing some ongoing effects of COVID-19 on the development, behavior or demeanor of certain children.

Correspondingly, 38% of Macclesfield South Planning Area-based registered childminders stated that they were still noticing some ongoing effects of COVID-19 on the development, behavior or demeanor of certain children.

Ultimately, all setting-based (early years and out of school) childcare providers were requested to state, on a scale of 1 - 10, how **confident** they thought they were as a whole setting in supporting children/young people with SEND:

The average rating provided by early years childcare providers/setting was 7.6/10 – and thus it can be assumed that approximately 76% of early years providers are accessible to children with SEND in the Macclesfield South Schools Planning Area.

The average rating provided by out of school childcare providers/setting was 7/10 – and thus it can be assumed that approximately 70% of out of school providers are accessible to children with SEND in the Macclesfield South Schools Planning Area.

Additionally, the average rating provided by registered childminders was 7.25/10 – and thus it can be assumed that approximately 72% of childminders are accessible to children with SEND in the Macclesfield South Schools Planning Area.

Role of Cheshire East Council

Finally, all childcare providers were invited to state the types of further and continued support that they would appreciate from the local authority. The most frequent requests were:

- 1. Support to ensure training can be facilitated in the evenings and at weekends
- 2. (More) provision of free or affordable training
- 3. Networking themed support for childminders to help address feelings of isolation

Perspective of Parents and Carers resident in the Macclesfield South Schools Planning Area

Background of respondents

3% of the respondents to the summer 2022 Cheshire East Council Childcare Parental Demand survey were resident in the Macclesfield South Schools Planning Area.

All responding parents and carers across all of the Schools Planning Areas were invited to state what term best described their current circumstances aligned to their **employment status**. The most frequent stated circumstance of responding parents was in full-time employment/self-employment (30 hours + per week) (53%), followed in frequency by part-time employment/self-employment (less than 30 hours per week) (20%).

All responding parents and carers responding from the Macclesfield South Schools Planning Area were invited to state their annual family income bracket (before tax).

Feedback from carers of children and young people with SEND

20% of responding parents, i.e. carers, who were resident in the Macclesfield South Schools Planning Area stated that they were caring for/raising at least one child with SEND or a long-term illness.

The most frequent SEND type stated was Speech, Language and Communication Needs followed in frequency by Autistic Spectrum Condition.

These relevant respondents were invited to describe any particular issue(s) they have experienced as a carer of a child with SEND in accessing childcare – and the most frequent was: Staff are not appropriately trained/qualified to support children with SEND.

The three most frequent themes and assurances that such relevant parents/carers stated that they would look for if they were to consider accessing formal childcare at some point in the future were – in order of frequency:

- 1. For it to be close to my home
- 2. For it to be close to my child(ren)'s school
- 3. Social opportunities for my child(ren)

Funded Childcare

20% of responding Macclesfield South Schools Planning Area-resident, parents/carers stated that they had a child aged 2 years. One such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the free entitlement for 2 year olds.

Additionally, 53% of responding parents/carers stated that they had a child aged 3 and/or 4 years. Although 0 such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the universal 15 hours free entitlement for 3 and 4 year olds, 27% did subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the extended 30 hours childcare offer, with all of these parents/carers stating that it was either very easy to organise or fairly straightforward to organise – with just one exception, a parent that stated: it was not as easy as I would have liked. This parents elaborated:

"I found the fees very confusing. It wasn't clear what we would need to pay once the 30 hours were taken into account. [In my opinion] it wasn't made clear the limitations of the 30 hours free".

Another relevant parents stated:

"Ideally, it could be used over 'shorter days' so you could get two free long days rather than split over the week".

Childcare and COVID-19

All Macclesfield South Schools Planning Area-resident parents of pre-school aged children were invited to state whether they had any concerns about their relevant child(ren)'s early development, including their early years education, as a direct result of the COVID-19 pandemic? (Only) 12% of relevant parents stated Yes and the most frequent type of concerns related to setbacks in social skills, and speech and language delays.

Barriers to accessing childcare

All Macclesfield South Schools Planning Area-resident parents were invited to state whether – at some point in time – they had accessed specific barriers to accessing childcare. Two barrier types were repeated:

- 1. I could not/cannot afford the childcare that I require (27%)
- 2. I had doubts about the quality of provision (20%)

Childcare and Cheshire East Council

All Macclesfield South Schools Planning Area-resident parents were invited to state whether there was anything that Cheshire East Council should be doing in terms of supporting parents and carers with childcare, in 2022. Feedback from individual parents/carers - which repeatedly focused on the theme of SEND - included:

Cheshire East Council might organise more SEND training for the children that struggle socially and emotionally to regulate their emotions?

If they could ensure nursery's/pre-schools know the Autism pathway...

Finally, all parents were invited to state whether they were aware of the existence of Cheshire East Family Information Service. For those who responded to this question: 40% stated that they were – and 60% stated that they were not, or did not provide a specific response either way.
