# Nantwich Rural North

Future demand for early years childcare places and out of school childcare places will in all probability be met by existing provision over the five years - moving toward 2027. However this sufficiency situation will require monitoring.

Existing providers may need to prepare for a small increase in demand.

## Supply and Provision dynamics

Providers located in the Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area

The following **early years childcare settings/providers** are located in the Schools Planning Area

- Early Birds Nursery
- Calveley Primary Academy
- St. Oswald's Worleston CE Primary Academy
- Just Childcare Limited


These four providers account for a combined total of 95 registered places.

The following out of school childcare provider is located in the Schools Planning Area:

- Bunbury Aldersey CofE Primary School After School Club and Breakfast Club
- Calveley Primary Academy After School Club, Breakfast Club and Holiday Playscheme
- St Oswald's Worleston CofE Primary School

These three providers accounts for a total of 244 registered places. Additionally, one **registered childminder** is evidently resident in the Schools Planning Area and that individual accounts for a total of 6 registered places.

## Occupancy Dynamics in summer 2022

- 33% of all relevant providers stated that they had seen a waiting list decrease in size since summer 2021
- 33% of all relevant providers also stated that they had seen a waiting increase in size since summer 2021
- For Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area-based early years childcare providers/settings, the age group that accounted for the highest incidence of vacant places was 3 years

Ultimately, aligned to the period: May 2021 - May 2022:

- 25% of Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area-based childcare providers stated: Our occupancy has *decreased*
- 62% Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area-based childcare providers stated: Our occupancy has *increased*

## Demand

Table 5 presents:

- (b) an indication about the extent to which forthcoming new housing developments (see Table 1) will alter the sufficiency landscape once all planned developments and new houses are constructed and occupied

Table 5 indicates that 6 new childcare places may be required by 2027:

- 2 new early years childcare places for 0-4 years would be required to maintain the 2022 sufficiency ratio.
- 4 new out of school childcare places for 5-11 year olds would be required to maintain the 2022 sufficiency ratio.

However, it can be noted in Table 6 below that, as part of the response to the summer 2022 CSA structured interviews with childcare providers, 40% of early years childcare providers/settings that are located in the Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area stated an intention to develop new provision in the forthcoming two years - which was a combined total of 17 new places.



## Sustainability

40% of early years childcare providers/settings situated in the Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area stated that they were experiencing **ongoing** sustainability issues as a result of COVID-19 – and repeated themes were:

- 1. Recruitment of staff creating sustainability challenges
- 2. Inability to physically expand in current space

0 of out of school childcare providers situated in the Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area stated that they were experiencing ongoing sustainability issues as a result of COVID-19.

The one responding registered childminders situated in the Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area stated that they were experiencing ongoing sustainability issues as a result of COVID-19 – and this was aligned to local parents not (in their opinion) being well enough informed about the availability of funded childcare.






Image D - length of time childcare providers stated that they expected to be providing childcare for




## SEND


57% of setting-based early years childcare and out of school childcare providers stated that they had at least one team member with a SEND-themed qualification. Repeated examples of qualifications stated were:

- A trained SENCO
- Staff member(s) with speech and language training

38% of Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area-based early years childcare settings/providers and out of school childcare providers stated that they were still noticing some ongoing effects of COVID-19 on the development, behavior or demeanor of certain children.

Correspondingly, the one responding Nantwich Rural North Planning Area-based registered childminder stated that they were not noticing some ongoing effects of COVID-19 on the development, behavior or demeanor of certain children.

Ultimately, all setting-based (early years and out of school) childcare providers were requested to state, on a scale of 1 - 10, how <u>confident</u> they thought they were as a whole setting in supporting children/young people with SEND:

The average rating provided by early years childcare providers/setting was 9/10 – and thus it can be assumed that approximately 90% of early years providers are accessible to children with SEND in the Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area.

The average rating provided by out of school childcare providers/setting was also 9/10 – and thus it can be assumed that approximately 90% of out of school providers are accessible to children with SEND in the Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area.

Additionally, the average rating provided by the registered childminders was 8/10.

## Role of Cheshire East Council

Finally, all childcare providers were invited to state the types of further and continued support that they would appreciate from the local authority. The sole repeated request was: Continued information on the availability of grants (funding).

# Perspective of Parents and Carers resident in the Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area

#### Background of respondents

2% of the respondents to the summer 2022 Cheshire East Council Childcare Parental Demand survey were resident in the Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area.

All responding parents and carers across all of the Schools Planning Areas were invited to state what term best described their current circumstances aligned to their **employment status**. The most frequent stated circumstance of responding parents was in full-time employment/self-employment (30 hours + per week) (50%).

All responding parents and carers responding from the Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area were invited to state their annual family income bracket (before tax).

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#### Feedback from carers of children and young people with SEND

One responding parents, i.e. carers, who was resident in the Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area stated that they were caring for/raising at least one child with SEND, which was a Speech, Language and Communication Difficulty. This carer was accessing a holiday playscheme in summer 2022 on an ad-hoc basis. The carer stated that she had encountered challenges whereby staff at some formal childcare settings were not appropriately trained/qualified to support children with SEND.

- 0 of responding parents from the Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area stated that they were: **accessing informal childcare only**
- 20% of responding parents from the Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area stated that they were: **accessing formal and informal childcare**

All responding parents and carers were invited to state any types of *formal* childcare that they would like to access in the near future, which they were not accessing in summer 2022? The most frequent type of response was that a parent/carer (60%) wished to (continue to in one case) access a holiday playscheme.

#### Funded Childcare

0 of responding Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area-resident, parents/carers stated that they had a child aged 2 years.

Three parents had a 3 and/or 4 year old. One parent was currently accessing the universal 15 hours free entitlement for 3 and 4 year olds and was currently accessing the extended 30 hours childcare offer, which they had evidently found *"straightforward to access"*.

#### Barriers to accessing childcare

Nantwich Rural North Schools Planning Area-resident parents were invited to state whether – at some point in time – they had experienced specific barriers to accessing childcare. The one repeated type of barrier stated related to quality, with two parents/carers stating that they had experienced doubts as to whether staff at a setting/a childminder was adequately training to support children with additional needs.

#### **Cheshire East FIS**

Finally, all parents were invited to state whether they were aware of the existence of Cheshire East Family Information Service. 80% stated that they were not, or did not provide a specific response either way.
