Sandbach

Future demand for early years childcare places may not be met fully by recently opened, planned and intended expansions, plus the uptake of existing vacant places. Provision will need to be planned for an increase in demand for both out of school places and early years childcare places.



Table 5 indicates that 258 new childcare places may be required by 2027:

- 143 new early years childcare places for 0-4 years would be required to maintain the 2022 sufficiency ratio.
- 115 new out of school childcare places for 5-11 year olds would be required to maintain the 2022 sufficiency ratio.

However, it can be noted in Table 6 below that, as part of the response to the summer 2022 CSA structured interviews with childcare providers, 13% of early years childcare providers/settings that are located in the Sandbach Schools Planning Area stated an intention to develop new provision in the forthcoming two years - which was a combined total of 5 new places.



Sustainability

45% of early years childcare providers/settings and out of school childcare providers situated in the Sandbach Schools Planning Area stated that they were experiencing **ongoing** sustainability issues as a result of COVID-19 – and repeated themes were:

- 1. Recruitment of staff creating sustainability challenges
- 2. Concerns over revenue turnover

38% of registered childminders situated in the Sandbach Schools Planning Area stated that they were experiencing ongoing sustainability issues as a result of COVID-19 – and repeated themes were:

- 1. Concerns over revenue turnover
- 2. Subsequent occupancy challenges

Image C - how parents/families were continuing to feel in terms of their child(ren) (re)attending childcare, according to Sandbach Schools Planning Area-based childcare providers





Image D - length of time childcare providers stated that they expected to be providing childcare for

Image E - Numbers of enquiries that responding childcare providers stated that they received in each calendar year from a carer of a child with SEND





Image F - frequency with which childcare providers stated that they refer a family to another childcare provider if they cannot not take a SEND child for any reason



36% of Sandbach Schools Planning Area-based early years childcare settings/providers and out of school childcare providers stated that they were still noticing some ongoing effects of COVID-19 on the development, behavior or demeanor of certain children.

Correspondingly, 28% of Sandbach Planning Area-based registered childminders stated that they were still noticing some ongoing effects of COVID-19 on the development, behavior or demeanor of certain children.

Ultimately, all setting-based (early years and out of school) childcare providers were requested to state, on a scale of 1 - 10, how **confident** they thought they were as a whole

setting in supporting children/young people with SEND:

The average rating provided by early years childcare providers/setting was 7.4/10 – and thus it can be assumed that approximately 74% of early years providers are accessible to children with SEND in the Sandbach Schools Planning Area.

The average rating provided by out of school childcare providers/setting was 5.7/10 – and thus it can be assumed that approximately 57% of out of school providers are accessible to children with SEND in the Sandbach Schools Planning Area.

Additionally, the average rating provided by registered childminders was 7.5/10 – and thus it can be assumed that approximately 75% of childminders are accessible to children with SEND in the Sandbach Schools Planning Area.

Role of Cheshire East Council

Finally, all childcare providers were invited to state the types of further and continued support that they would appreciate from the local authority. The repeated requests were:

- 1. Support with meeting the needs of SEND children
- 2. Continued support with recruitment and retention
- 3. Support via dedicated childminder development officer

Perspective of Parents and Carers resident in the Sandbach Schools Planning Area

Background of respondents

9% of the respondents to the summer 2022 Cheshire East Council Childcare Parental Demand survey were resident in the Sandbach Schools Planning Area.

All responding parents and carers across all of the Schools Planning Areas were invited to state what term best described their current circumstances aligned to their **employment status**. The most frequent stated circumstance of responding parents was in full-time employment/self-employment (30 hours + per week) (30%), followed in frequency by part-time employment/self-employment (less than 30 hours per week) (20%).

All responding parents and carers responding from the Sandbach Schools Planning Area were invited to state their annual family income bracket (before tax).

Feedback from carers of children and young people with SEND

23% of responding parents, i.e. carers, who were resident in the Sandbach Schools Planning Area stated that they were caring for/raising at least one child with SEND or a long-term illness.

The most frequent SEND type stated was Speech, Language and Communication Needs followed in frequency by Global Development Delay.

These relevant respondents were invited to describe any particular issue(s) they have experienced as a carer of a child with SEND in accessing childcare – and the most frequent was: Limited choice of settings/activities for my SEND child.

The two most frequent themes and assurances that such relevant parents/carers stated that they would look for if they were to consider accessing formal childcare at some point in the future were – in order of frequency:

- 1. For it to be affordable
- 2. Good quality

Funded Childcare

23% of responding Sandbach Schools Planning Area-resident, parents/carers stated that they had a child aged 2 years. 28% of such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the free entitlement for 2 year olds.

Additionally, 27% of responding parents/carers stated that they had a child aged 3 and/or 4 years and 12.5% of such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the universal 15 hours free entitlement for 3 and 4 year olds.
62.5% of such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the extended 30 hours childcare offer, with all of these parents/carers stating that it was either very easy to organise or fairly straightforward to organise – with two exceptions, parents that stated: it was not as easy as I would have liked. One of these parents stated:

"There was no nursery in the area able to fulfil the full 30 hour".

The other parent stated:

"I was told about it [30 hours childcare] but was unsure if it was to use term-time only".

Childcare and COVID-19


All Sandbach Schools Planning Area-resident parents of pre-school aged children were invited to state whether they had any concerns about their relevant child(ren)'s early development, including their early years education, as a direct result of the COVID-19 pandemic?

23% of relevant parents stated Yes and the most frequent type of concern was (words to the effect): "we continue to see a particular effect on the social and emotional wellbeing of children".

Barriers to accessing childcare

All Sandbach Schools Planning Area-resident parents were invited to state whether – at some point in time – they had experienced specific barriers to accessing childcare:

Childcare and Cheshire East Council

All Sandbach Schools Planning Area-resident parents were invited to state whether there was anything that Cheshire East Council should be doing in terms of supporting parents and

carers with childcare, in 2022. Certain parents provided feedback on the theme of additional needs and childcare:

I have concerns about local nurseries meeting my child's additional needs. I started one nursery after being on a waiting list for a year and after only 6 sessions they told us they couldn't accommodate her and we had to find another once I'd gone back to work... so it was a really tough time

The local authority could make it easier and clearer for children with special needs. [In my opinion] the system is not designed to support children with additional needs. For example, the funding my daughter gets doesn't cover holiday time which puts nurseries off having her because they can't utilise the funding all year round. Nurseries should have to take children with special needs so they are inclusive of society...

Certain parents provided feedback on the theme of new housing developments:

The amount of new family houses that are being built around here concerns me... [in my opinion] there are not enough school and nurseries places... The best ones are extremely highly priced and people are not able to afford them...

The local authority need to ensure that childcare provision 'matches' the number of houses built. We live on a new estate and it feels like that hasn't been considered at all. It was so difficult to find a nursery place and I had to reduce my work hours because there was no available full time spaces.

Finally, all parents were invited to state whether they were aware of the existence of Cheshire East Family Information Service. For those who responded to this question: 37% stated that they were – and 63% stated that they were not, or did not provide a specific response either way.
