Shavington

Future demand for early years childcare places may not be met fully by recently opened, planned and intended expansions, plus the uptake of existing vacant places. Provision will need to be planned for an increase in demand for both out of school places and early years childcare places.

These seven providers account for a combined total of 516 registered places.


The following out of school childcare providers are located in the Schools Planning Area

- Wybunbury Delves CofE Primary School After School Club and Breakfast Club
- Wistaston Church Lane Academy After School Club and Breakfast Club

These five providers accounts for a total of 444 registered places.

Additionally, six **registered childminders** are resident in the Schools Planning Area and they are accounting for a combined total of 64 registered places.

- 25% of all relevant providers stated that they had seen a waiting list decrease in size since summer 2021
- 50% of all relevant providers stated that they had seen a waiting increase in size since summer 2021
- For Shavington Schools Planning Area-based early years childcare providers/settings, the age group that accounted for the highest incidence of vacant places was 0-12 months

Ultimately, aligned to the period: May 2021 - May 2022:

- 8% of Shavington Schools Planning Area-based childcare providers stated: Our occupancy has *decreased*
- 50% of Shavington Schools Planning Area-based childcare providers stated: Our occupancy has *increased*

Table 5 indicates that 398 new childcare places may be required by 2027:

- 189 new early years childcare places for 0-4 years would be required to maintain the 2022 sufficiency ratio.
- 209 new out of school childcare places for 5-11 year olds would be required to maintain the 2022 sufficiency ratio.

However, it can be noted in Table 6 below that, as part of the response to the summer 2022 CSA structured interviews with childcare providers, 17% of early years childcare providers/ settings that are located in the Shavington Schools Planning Area stated an intention to develop new provision in the forthcoming two years - which was a total of 16 new places.

• Training that was accessible outside of 8am - 6pm weekdays




Image B - level of concern that setting-based childcare providers had about the theme of workforce recruitment and retention, including for the forthcoming period: summer 2022 – summer 2023

Sustainability

28% of early years childcare providers/settings and out of school childcare providers that are situated in the Shavington Schools Planning Area stated that they were experiencing **ongoing** sustainability issues as a result of COVID-19 – and the one repeated theme was: recruitment of staff creating sustainability challenges.

60% of registered childminders situated in the Shavington Schools Planning Area stated that they were experiencing ongoing sustainability issues as a result of COVID-19 – and repeated themes were:

- 1. Incidence of parents still working from home post COVID-19...
- 2. subsequent occupancy challenges

Image C - how parents/families were continuing to feel in terms of their child(ren) (re)attending childcare, according to Shavington Schools Planning Area-based childcare providers





Image D - length of time childcare providers stated that they expected to be providing childcare for



SEND

100% of setting-based early years childcare and out of school childcare providers stated that they had at least one team member with a SEND-themed qualification. Repeated examples of qualifications stated were:

- A trained SENCO
- Staff member(s) with Autism training/qualification
- SEND training TA
- Speech and language therapy

Image E - Numbers of enquiries that responding childcare providers stated that they received in each calendar year from a carer of a child with SEND





Image F - frequency with which childcare providers stated that they refer a family to another childcare provider if they cannot not take a SEND child for any reason



67% of Shavington Schools Planning Area-based early years childcare settings/providers and out of school childcare providers stated that they were still noticing some ongoing effects of COVID-19 on the development, behavior or demeanor of certain children.

Correspondingly, 60% of Shavington Planning Area-based registered childminders stated that they were still noticing some ongoing effects of COVID-19 on the development, behavior or demeanor of certain children.

Ultimately, all setting-based (early years and out of school) childcare providers were requested to state, on a scale of 1 - 10, how <u>confident</u> they thought they were as a whole setting in supporting children/young people with SEND:

The average rating provided by early years childcare providers/settings was 8.3/10 – and thus it can be assumed that approximately 83% of early years providers are accessible to children with SEND in the Shavington Schools Planning Area.

The average rating provided by out of school childcare providers/settings was 1/10.

Additionally, the average rating provided by registered childminders was 6.2/10 – and thus it can be assumed that approximately 62% of childminders are accessible to children with SEND in the Shavington Schools Planning Area.

Role of Cheshire East Council

Finally, all childcare providers were invited to state the types of further and continued support that they would appreciate from the local authority. The two most frequent requests were:

- 1. Facilitation of a forum / networking event with other providers to mitigate feelings of isolation
- 2. Continuation of current support from Cheshire East, which has been supportive / good / helpful.

Perspective of Parents and Carers resident in the Shavington Schools Planning Area

Background of respondents

3% of the respondents to the summer 2022 Cheshire East Council Childcare Parental Demand survey were resident in the Shavington Schools Planning Area.

All responding parents and carers across all of the Schools Planning Areas were invited to state what term best described their current circumstances aligned to their **employment status**. The most frequent stated circumstance of responding parents was in part-time employment/self-employment (less than 30 hours per week) (25%).

All responding parents and carers responding from the Shavington Schools Planning Area were invited to state their annual family income bracket (before tax).

Feedback from carers of children and young people with SEND

0 responding parents, i.e. carers, who were resident in the Shavington Schools Planning Area stated that they were caring for/raising at least one child with SEND or a long-term illness.

- 50% of responding parents from the Shavington Schools Planning Area stated that they were: **accessing formal childcare only**
- 37% of responding parents from the Shavington Schools Planning Area stated that they were: **accessing informal childcare only**
- 13% of responding parents from the Shavington Schools Planning Area stated that they were: accessing formal and informal childcare

Funded Childcare

22% of responding Shavington Schools Planning Area-resident, parents/carers stated that they had a child aged 2 years. However, 0 such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the free entitlement for 2 year olds.

Additionally, 55% of responding parents/carers stated that they had a child aged 3 and/or 4 years. 0 such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the universal 15 hours free entitlement for 3 and 4 year olds. 40% of such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the extended 30 hours childcare offer

Childcare and COVID-19

All Shavington Schools Planning Area-resident parents of pre-school aged children were invited to state whether they had any concerns about their relevant child(ren)'s early development, including their early years education, as a direct result of the COVID-19 pandemic?

11% of relevant parents stated Yes, with one parent stating:

"We have not been able to go in to nursery to drop off/collect, which often means only a short chat at door. I feel like we don't get a go overview of our child's progress, just a short handover as a queue is forming".

Barriers to accessing childcare

All Shavington Schools Planning Area-resident parents were invited to state whether – at some point in time – they had experienced specific barriers to accessing childcare. One barrier only was repeated: I could not/cannot afford the childcare that I require.

Childcare and Cheshire East Council

All Shavington Schools Planning Area-resident parents were invited to state whether there was anything that Cheshire East Council should be doing in terms of supporting parents and carers with childcare, in 2022. The most frequent type of feedback concerned *their perceptions* of the childcare and early years sector:

Someone need to ensure that nurseries are properly funded for their 'free hour's. All seem to need to top-up with charging for consumables etc to plug the shortfall. The staff are doing such a crucial job and should be fairly paid

Looking at the costs of childcare ... it's cheaper for some parents to look after their children and not return to work. My childcare is only just covered by my work Finally, all parents were invited to state whether they were aware of the existence of Cheshire East Family Information Service. For those who responded to this question: 11% stated that they were not, or did not provide a specific response either way.
