# Wilmslow North

Future demand for early years childcare places may not be met fully by the uptake of existing vacant places. Provision will need to be planned for an increase in demand for both out of school places and (to a lesser extent) early years childcare places.



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# Occupancy Dynamics in summer 2022

- 0 of all relevant providers stated that they had seen a waiting list decrease in size since summer 2021
- 66% of all relevant providers stated that they had seen a waiting increase in size since summer 2021
- For Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area-based early years childcare providers/settings, the age group that accounted for the highest incidence of vacant places was 3 years

Ultimately, aligned to the period: May 2021 - May 2022:

- 18% of Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area-based childcare providers stated: Our occupancy has *decreased*
- 54% of Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area-based childcare providers stated: Our occupancy has *increased*

# Demand

Table 5 presents:

  1/ early years childcare settings; 2/ registered childminders and; 3/ out of school childcare providers.
- (b) an indication about the extent to which forthcoming new housing developments (see Table 1) will alter the sufficiency landscape once all planned developments and new houses are constructed and occupied.

Table 5 indicates that 23 new childcare places may be required by 2027:

- 2 new early years childcare places for 0-4 years would be required to maintain the 2022 sufficiency ratio.
- 21 new out of school childcare places for 5-11 year olds would be required to maintain the 2022 sufficiency ratio.

As part of the response to the summer 2022 CSA structured interviews with childcare providers, 0 childcare providers/settings that are located in the Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area stated an intention to develop new provision in the forthcoming two years.

- Wanted a role with less hours

Stated posts/positions that evidently were aligned to recruitment or retention challenges/difficulties *included*:


- Qualified to Level 3

# Sustainability

56% of early years childcare providers/settings situated in the Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area stated that they were experiencing **ongoing** sustainability issues as a result of COVID-19 – and repeated themes were:

- 1. Recruitment of staff creating sustainability challenges with the issue aligned to...
- 2. Wages being too low
- 3. Not having the physical space to increase capacity

0 of out of school childcare providers situated in the Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area stated that they were experiencing ongoing sustainability issues as a result of COVID-19.

...and 100% of registered childminders situated in the Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area stated that they were experiencing ongoing sustainability issues as a result of COVID-19 – and the one repeated theme was: parents are evidently favouring daycare as an option.





Image C - how parents/families were continuing to feel in terms of their child(ren) (re)attending childcare, according to Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area-based childcare providers

## SEND

80% of setting-based early years childcare and out of school childcare providers stated that they had at least one team member with a SEND-themed qualification. Repeated examples of qualifications stated were:

- A trained SENCO
- Staff member(s) with Autism training/qualification
- Makaton trained

Image E - Numbers of enquiries that responding childcare providers stated that they received in each calendar year from a carer of a child with SEND





Image F - frequency with which childcare providers stated that they refer a family to another childcare provider if they cannot not take a SEND child for any reason



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80% of Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area-based early years childcare settings/providers and out of school childcare providers stated that they were still noticing some ongoing effects of COVID-19 on the development, behavior or demeanor of certain children.

Correspondingly, 50% of Wilmslow North Planning Area-based registered childminders stated that they were still noticing some ongoing effects of COVID-19 on the development, behavior or demeanor of certain children.

Ultimately, all setting-based (early years and out of school) childcare providers were requested to state, on a scale of 1 - 10, how <u>confident</u> they thought they were as a whole setting in supporting children/young people with SEND:

The average rating provided by early years childcare providers/setting was 7.3/10 – and thus it can be assumed that approximately 73% of early years providers are accessible to children with SEND in the Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area.

The average rating provided by out of school childcare providers/setting was 6/10 – and thus it can be assumed that approximately 60% of out of school providers are accessible to children with SEND in the Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area.

Additionally, the average rating provided by registered childminders was 6.5/10 – and thus it can be assumed that approximately 65% of childminders are accessible to children with SEND in the Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area.

## Role of Cheshire East Council

Finally, all childcare providers were invited to state the types of further and continued support that they would appreciate from the local authority. The two repeated requests were:

- 1. Advice on recruitment and retention
- 2. Exert any influence they can to enhance hourly rate for funded childcare

Perspective of Parents and Carers resident in the Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area

#### Background of respondents

5% of the respondents to the summer 2022 Cheshire East Council Childcare Parental Demand survey were resident in the Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area.

All responding parents and carers across all of the Schools Planning Areas were invited to state what term best described their current circumstances aligned to their **employment status**. The most frequent stated circumstance of responding parents was in full-time employment/self-employment (30 hours + per week) (35%).

All responding parents and carers responding from the Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area were invited to state their annual family income bracket (before tax).

#### Feedback from carers of children and young people with SEND

4% of responding parents, i.e. carers, who were resident in the Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area stated that they were caring for/raising at least one child with SEND or a long-term illness.

The most frequent SEND type stated was Autistic Spectrum Condition.

These relevant respondents were invited to describe any particular issue(s) they have experienced as a carer of a child with SEND in accessing childcare – and the most frequent was: setting unable to cater for my children's special needs or disabilities.

The one repeated them and assurance that such relevant parents/carers stated that they would look for if they were to consider accessing formal childcare at some point in the future was: My transport (public or private) to be straightforward for me as parent, dropping-off & picking-up.

# Funded Childcare

35% of responding Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area-resident, parents/carers stated that they had a child aged 2 years. (Only) 12% of such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the free entitlement for 2 year olds.

Additionally, 58% of responding parents/carers stated that they had a child aged 3 and/or 4 years and 36% of such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the universal 15 hours free entitlement for 3 and 4 year olds. 28% of such parents/carers subsequently stated that they were currently accessing the extended 30 hours childcare offer, with all of these parents/carers stating that it was either very easy to organise or fairly straightforward to organise – with two exceptions, both parent stating: it was not as easy as I would have liked.

Relevant parents tended to give further feedback about the 30 hours childcare offer – which focused on structural factors:

"It should, in my opinion, be based on joint income not just one parent".

"Those born early in a term have to wait until the following term to receive '30 hours'.

My eldest was born early October 2018 but couldn't claim until January and my second child was born this early April... but I can't claim until September".


#### Childcare and COVID-19

All Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area-resident parents of pre-school aged children were invited to state whether they had any concerns about their relevant child(ren)'s early development, including their early years education, as a direct result of the COVID-19 pandemic? 12.5% of relevant parents stated Yes, with one parent providing:

"My daughter did not socialise with other children at this time... We don't have any family living close to us, so COVID impacted on the development of her social skills".



#### Childcare and Cheshire East Council

All Wilmslow North Schools Planning Area-resident parents were invited to state whether there was anything that Cheshire East Council should be doing in terms of supporting parents and carers with childcare, in 2022. Their feedback focused on the theme of affordability:



Finally, all parents were invited to state whether they were aware of the existence of Cheshire East Family Information Service. For those who responded to this question: 29% stated that they were – and 71% stated that they were not, or did not provide a specific response either way.
